Letter from the President

In 2003, my husband and I were on a bicycle ride and happened past Billerica Animal Control. As we rode past the outdoor kennels, I noticed a small beagle with a large tumor that had grown under his jaw. That caused me to stop to learn more about this little guy. Which then turned into a search to find someone to provide medical care for "Bailey" (that was his name). After receiving permission from the town for a no-kill beagle rescue (B.O.N.E.S.) to take Bailey in for foster and vet care, I started thinking about what it would be like to have a no-kill animal rescue organization in our town.


After visiting other organizations to learn about animal rescue methods, with a small amount of publicity, on a rainy May night in 2004, 22 people with big hearts and vision, joined me to discuss what we could do to help animals in need. In particular, the discussion focused on cats and kittens, since it appeared there was already some established dog rescues in surrounding areas, but, no cat rescues here. The result - Billerica Cat Care Coalition (BCCC) was born. Even though I did not have a cat when we started, it didn't take long for that to change.

In 2014, BCCC is celebrating our tenth year of existence, with more than 1,000 feral cats in and around Billerica spayed or neutered, to humanely help end the cycle of over reproduction. And, hundreds of friendly, abandoned cats and kittens have found their forever, loving homes. We've met and made so many friends along the way - via our trap/neuter/return (TNR) program for ferals or you've adopted our rescued cats and kittens or you've helped support our programs by volunteering, donating and attending our events.

What started with a bike ride on a sunny day and one small beagle in need, has turned into a community organization of talented volunteers dedicated to principals and actions of the no-kill movement. We know from your support in the public, you agree. We look forward to seeing you at our events and greatly appreciate your continued support.

From all of us at BCCC, and, from those who cannot speak for themselves, thank you.

Feline Immunodeficiency Virus and CATS

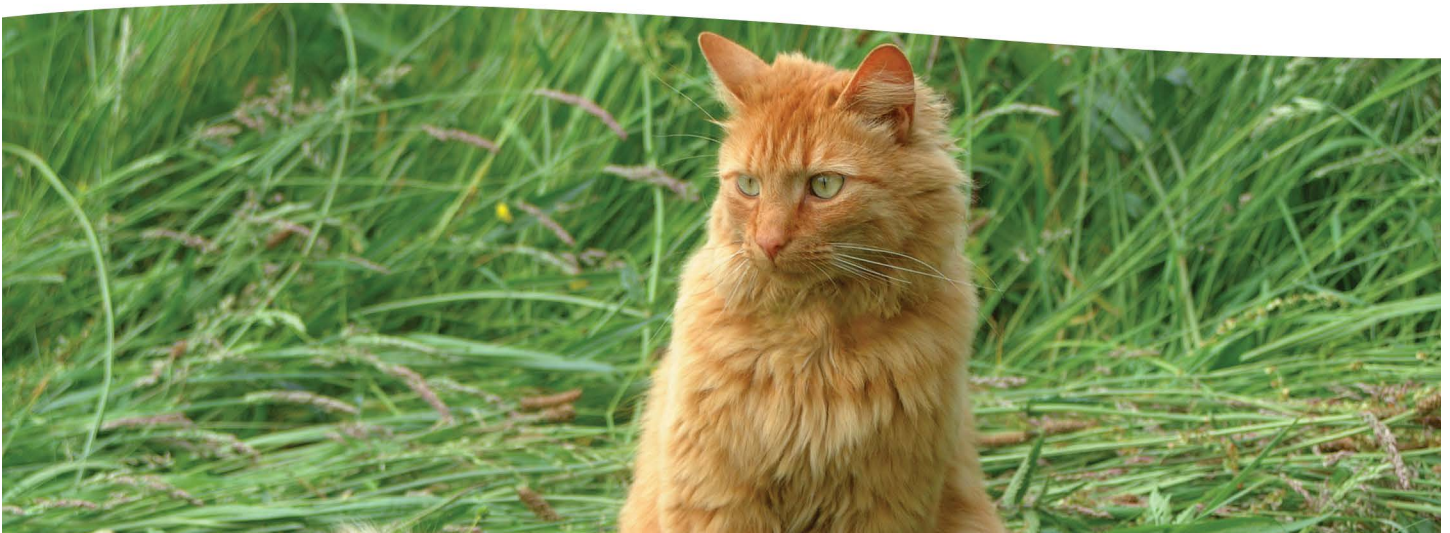
When you are looking for a new kitty from a rescue group or shelter, you may sometimes see a really cute or handsome cat that appeals to you, but he or she may be labeled as FIV-positive. What does this mean and how does it affect your decision about whether or not to bring that cat into your home?

“FIV-positive” means that a cat has antibodies to FIV in his or her bloodstream, indicating that he or she has been exposed to FIV and is therefore infected. FIV is a viral infection and the initials stand for Feline Immunodeficiency Virus. It is in the same family of viruses as HIV, but it cannot infect people and there are some important differences between the human and feline infections. Like HIV, FIV cannot live outside of the body and so can't be spread by casual contact. In cats it is usually spread in the saliva by deep bite wounds and occasionally from a mother cat to kittens during the birth process. It is usually not a sexually transmitted disease in cats. Unneutered male cats, or tomcats, are most commonly infected because they fight with other tomcats over females and territory. FIV infects white blood cells called T-lymphocytes and can hamper a cat's ability to respond to infections with other viruses and bacteria, but luckily it rarely leads to the full-blown immune system failure that is characteristic of AIDS in people.

Although the decision of whether or not to adopt an FIV-positive cat is ultimately up to you, you should not immediately turn away from these cats. Since FIV is not easily spread between cats, it is usually possible to bring an FIV-positive cat into your home and have him live safely with FIV-negative cats as long as you introduce them properly. A careful, slow introduction, which is the least stressful way to introduce a new cat regardless of his or her infection status, will help to minimize the possibility of serious fighting that could spread infection. FIV-positive cats, just like all cats, should have regular veterinary checkups to watch for signs of problems secondary to the infection. They may be more likely than the average cat to have trouble with respiratory infections, dental inflammation, allergies, and cancers such as lymphoma, but these are problems that we see even in FIV-negative cats. Most FIV-positive cats have a normal lifespan.

The best way to prevent cats from picking up an FIV infection is to spay and neuter them to decrease roaming and fighting over mates and territory, and to keep cats indoors. A vaccine is available for FIV but is not currently recommended by the American Association of Feline Practitioners because the test for FIV involves looking for antibodies to the infection and vaccinated cats test positive for these antibodies. Until a better test is available to tell the difference between infected and vaccinated cats, the decision of whether to vaccinate your cat should involve a careful and informed discussion between you and your veterinarian.

Providing for Your Pet's Future Without You

Because pets usually have shorter life spans than their human caregivers, you may have planned for your animal friend's passing. But what if you are the one who becomes ill or incapacitated, or who dies first? As a responsible pet owner, you provide your pet with food and water, shelter, veterinary care, and love. To ensure that your beloved pet will continue to receive this care should something unexpected happen to you, it's critical to plan ahead. This information sheet helps you do just that.

What can I do now to prepare for the unexpected?

In the confusion that accompanies a person's unexpected illness, accident, or death, pets may be overlooked. In some cases, pets are discovered in the person's home days after the tragedy. To prevent this from happening to your pet, take these simple precautions:

- Find at least two responsible friends or relatives who agree to serve as temporary emergency caregivers in the event that something unexpected happens to you. Provide them with keys to your home; feeding and care instructions; the name of your veterinarian; and information about the permanent care provisions you have made for your pet.
- Make sure your neighbors, friends, and relatives know how many pets you have and the names and contact numbers of the individuals who have agreed to serve as emergency caregivers. Emergency caregivers should also know how to contact each other.
- Carry a wallet "alert card" that lists the names and phone numbers of your emergency pet caregivers.
- Post removable "in case of emergency" notices on your doors or windows specifying how many and what types of pets you have. These notices will alert emergency-response personnel during a fire or other home emergency. Don't use stickers; hard-to-remove stickers are often left behind by former residents, so firefighters may assume that the sticker is outdated or, worse, they may risk their lives trying to find a pet no longer in the house.
- Affix to the inside of your front and back doors a removable notice listing emergency contact names and phone numbers. Because pets need care daily and will need immediate attention should you die or become incapacitated, the importance of making these informal arrangements for temporary caregiving cannot be overemphasized.

How can I ensure long-term or permanent care for my pet if I become seriously ill or die?

The best way to make sure your wishes are fulfilled is by also making formal arrangements that specifically cover the care of your pet. It's not enough that long ago your friend verbally promised to take in your animal or even that you've decided to leave money to your friend for that purpose. Work with an attorney to draw up a special will, trust, or other document to provide for the care and ownership of your pet as well as the money necessary to care for her.

Do I need legal assistance?

Before making formal arrangements to provide for the long-term care of your pet, seek help from professionals who can guide you in preparing legal documents that can protect your interests and those of your pet. However, you must keep in mind the critical importance of making advance personal arrangements to ensure that your pet is cared for immediately if you die or become incapacitated. The formalities of a will or trust may not take over for some time.

Is a will the best way to provide for my pet?

Although your lawyer will help you decide what type of document best suits your needs, you should be aware of some drawbacks to wills. For example, a will takes effect only upon your death, and it will not be probated and formally recognized by a court for days or even weeks later. What's more, if legal disputes arise, the final settlement of your property may be prolonged. Even determining the rightful new owner of your pet can get delayed. In other words, it may take a long time before your instructions regarding your pet's long-term care can be carried out.

This doesn't necessarily mean that you should not include a provision in your will that provides for your pet. It just means that you should explore creating additional documents that compensate for the will's limitations.

What is Trap-Neuter-Return (TNR)?

Trap-Neuter-Return is the humane and effective approach for stray and feral cats. Now in practice for decades in the US after being proven in Europe, scientific studies show that Trap-Neuter-Return improves the lives of feral cats, improves their relationships with the people who live near them, and decreases the size of colonies over time.

Trap-Neuter-Return is successfully practiced in hundreds of communities and in every landscape and setting. It is exactly what it sounds like: Cats are humanely trapped and taken to a veterinarian to be neutered and vaccinated. After recovery, the cats are returned to their home - their colony - outdoors. Kittens and cats who are friendly and socialized to people may be adopted into homes.

Grounded in science, TNR stops the breeding cycle of cats and therefore improves their lives while preventing reproduction. It is a fact that the removal and killing of outdoor cats that animal control has been pursuing for decades is never ending and futile. Since feral cats are not adoptable, they are killed in pounds and shelters. With a successful program like Trap-Neuter-Return to turn to, it's hard to believe that animal control agencies continue to kill cats, even though that approach has shown zero results.

It is time to put an end to catch and kill. Trap-Neuter-Return provides a life-saving, effective solution for these beautiful, independent cats.

There are so many reasons to embrace and promote TNR! Trap-Neuter-Return:

- **Stabilizes feral cat colonies**
- **Improves cats' lives**
- **Answers the needs of the community**
- **Protects cats' lives**
- **Works - other methods just don't**

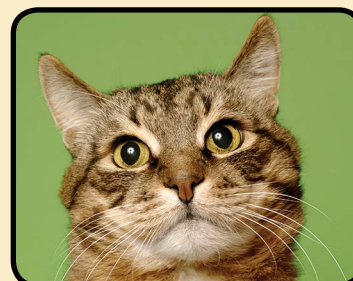
